Annotated provisional agenda

1. Opening of the ministerial segment

The ministerial segment will begin with an opening ceremony, at which the Chair of the outgoing Bureau of the Conference of African Ministers of Finance, Planning and Economic Development and the Executive Secretary of the Economic Commission for Africa (ECA) will deliver welcoming statements. The Head of Government of Morocco will deliver the official opening address.

2. Election of the Bureau and adoption of the agenda and programme of work

The composition of the new Bureau of the Conference of Ministers will be announced, following consultations. The Bureau will comprise five members (one Chair, three Vice-Chairs and one Rapporteur), who will be elected on the basis of equitable geographical representation. The composition of the Bureau elected at the previous sessions is set out in the annex to the present document. Following brief remarks, the incoming Chair will preside over the remainder of the proceedings. The Conference of Ministers will be invited to consider and adopt the agenda and programme of work, subject to such amendments as are deemed necessary.

3. Dialogue on the theme of the fifty-eighth session of the Economic Commission for Africa

Documentation

Issues paper: growth through innovation: harnessing data and frontier technologies for the economic transformation of Africa (E/ECA/COE/44/6-E/ECA/CM/58/4)

During the dialogue, issues relating to the theme of the session will be explored under the following sub-items:

(a) Overview of current global economic trends, related challenges and their implications for Africa

The Deputy Executive Secretary (Programme) and Chief Economist of ECA, Hanan Morsy, will brief ministers on current global economic trends, related challenges and their implications for Africa. She will then engage in an interactive discussion with ministers about the central issues covered in the briefing.

(b) Keynote address: 2026 Adebayo Adedeji Memorial Lecture

The [position, organization, name – to be determined], will deliver the annual Adebayo Adedeji Memorial Lecture. Thereafter, ministers will be invited to share their views on the issues raised in the lecture, in the form of an interactive discussion.

(c) Launch of the 2026 edition of the Economic Report on Africa

The Director of the Macroeconomic Policy, Finance and Governance Division of ECA, Stephen Karingi, will present a summary of the principal findings and conclusions set out in the report. Subsequently, ministers will be invited to share their views on the findings and conclusions, in the form of an interactive discussion.

(d) High-level discussion

A high-level discussion will be held, in which ministers will have a further opportunity to share their views on issues emanating from the keynote address and from the presentation of the 2026 edition of the Economic Report on Africa.

4. High-level round-table discussions

Two high-level round-table discussions will be held to explore topics relating to the theme of the session. Ministers and leading experts from international organizations, civil society and the private sector will be invited to share their views on the topic of each round-table discussion.

5. Launch of the Sustainable Health Financing Initiative

The Chief of Staff of ECA, Aboubakri Diaw, will present the principal features of the Sustainable Health Financing Initiative. Thereafter, ministers will be invited to share their views on the Initiative.

6. Consideration of recommendations and adoption of resolutions

Under this agenda item, the Rapporteur of the Committee of Experts will present the major conclusions, recommendations and draft resolutions from the meeting of the Committee to the Conference of Ministers for its consideration and adoption.

7. Consideration and adoption of the ministerial statement

Under this agenda item, the Conference of Ministers may wish to consider and adopt a ministerial policy statement, in which the views of the ministers on the theme of the session and on other policy and operational issues are articulated.

8. Other matters

The Conference of Ministers may wish to consider any other matter that may be brought to its attention.

9. Closing of the ministerial segment and the fifty-eighth session of the Economic Commission for Africa

The Executive Secretary of the Economic Commission for Africa will deliver brief closing remarks. The Chair of the Bureau will highlight the main outcomes and close the ministerial segment and the fifty-eighth session of the Commission.
