Enhancing Policy & Action for Safe Mobility

There is a need for a paradigm shift from the traditional approach to the Safe System approach to road safety which has yielded tangible and measurable results.

Two main "entry points" to succeed :



1. Embed the Safe System approach in transport strategies, policies, and programs.

2. Build consistent support for the Safe System: capacity development, awareness strategies.

 We have collectively laid-out a process to turn high-level statements into actionable work in practice.

- In line with the recommendations of the new Global Plan for the Decade, we suggest how countries can implement a systemic and integrated approach to road safety in a way that will have synergies and positive spillover effects on the other three policy goals of sustainable mobility.
- Actionable policy guidance + with case examples and resources on how the Safe System approach can be mainstreamed in road safety, sustainable mobility, and urban development.
