2019-2020

- **Consultative Meetings**
- February: Consultations with MS | Addis Ababa.
- May: Accra
- August : Johannesburg
- October: Ministers (Comms 6) responsible for health and Civil Registration and Vital Statistics, held the 5th conference and one of the key outcomes was to develop a Continental framework for Mortality Surveillance

2021

April 2021: Technical

- Technical Working Group was created in April of 2021 with representation from Africa CDC, AUC, Member States and Partners, to review the initial draft of the Continental Framework. who completed this process.
- April 2021: Africa CDC conducted a virtual consultation meeting with Member States, Regional Economic Communities, Partners, to validate the Continental Framework

2022

- March 2022: Convened a physical meeting in Kenya to review the Continental Framework.
- Developed road map for implementation
- Electronic copies were disseminated

2022

- Sept 2022: Launch of the Continental Framework.
- Communique for strengthening mortality surveillance

The Framework will provide guidance to support the AU Member States to Integrate routine surveillance data from different systems into a national repository for mortality data

Benefits of the Continental Framework

- Strengthening the availability of national and subnational data on the numbers, characteristics, and causes of death will facilitate evidence-based decision-making and planning at all levels;
- Integrating routine surveillance data from different systems into a national repository for mortality data will help to address the challenge of fragmented information systems and reduce the pressure on the limited resources and the burden of reporting imposed on health workers because of the parallel systems;
- Sharing information between the health sector and civil registration and vital statistics systems through the identification and notification of death events occurring within health facilities and communities, including information on causes of death, will complement and catalyze the official registration of deaths.





Commitments by Africa CDC & Partners

- **Digitization:** Supporting automation and creation of mortality data platforms to enable data and information sharing at the continental level
- Workforce Development: Strengthening capacity for health workforce by providing trainings and regional experience sharing on
- Resource Mobilisation: Develop a continental investment case for implementing mortality surveillance in alignment with existing initiatives
- Partnerships & collaboration: Enhance synergy between Health & CRVS actors in improving mortality data
- Innovation & Research: Invest in research and innovation to safeguard the health security and ensure that we achieve the aspirations of agenda 2063





Member States Commitments

- Adopt and integrate the continental framework for mortality surveillance in the existing policies
- Set up multi sectoral working groups at the national level
- Develop and implement the national roadmap for mortality surveillance in line with the continental framework
- Sensitizing decision-makers on the continental framework to enhance political will and commitment
- Integrate mortality surveillance into the national development plans to be funded by the government
- Identify the national coordinating agency and focal person for the rollout of the continental strategy & implementation of the roadmaps





Next steps

- Development of Country and Sub-regional Specific Road maps for the implementation of the framework
- Technical support to the Member States to finalize the development and implementation of the Roadmaps
- Harmonization of mortality data platforms
- Generation of mortality information products (data consolidation, generation of mortality statistics and information products)
- Support stakeholder engagement
- Support regional Technical Working Groups
