

Average GDP Growth Rates (%), 2015 – 2021^f




In 2020, the **most negatively impacted economies** were:






Hospitality and education are consistently among the worse hit sectors, while ICT thrived

Visitor arrival numbers have not yet recovered, mainly due to **heightened border controls** and **depressed tourism demand**



(African av. driven by Zimbabwe's hyperinflation?)




...But it has been conducive to inflationary pressures in some sub-sectors (food, transport, etc.)




Commodity Price Indices, % change from 2019 to 2020





Services Exports (USD millions), January 2020 – latest month




Overall Fiscal Balance, Excluding Grants (% of GDP), 2020


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Debt levels are rising sharply...


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



Attracting FDI has become more challenging...



- Overall FDI into East Africa declined by 14%
- Tourism sector FDI project numbers declined by 67%
- Communications sector cross-border capital investments grew by 41%


Containment measures have led most of Eastern Africa to relatively low COVID-19 infection and death rates

However the **COVID-19 delta variant** has been driving a third infectious wave

Eastern Africa rates of incidence and death are significantly lower than the continental and global averages




Economic recovery is partially dependent on attaining high vaccination rates




School closures affecting 96 million learners in Eastern Africa

Reduced the max. individual tax rate from 30% to 25%; granted full tax relief for gross incomes under KES 24,000 monthly




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

Implementing the AfCFTA can contribute to regional economic recovery

Growing evidence that regional trade has been more resilient than extra-regional trade during the crisis e.g. Nicita and Saygali (2021) and AERC/ECA/TMEA (2021)
